ODFW Fishing Report (as of March 3rd)

Look for water conditions and winter steelhead fishing to be good on the Nestucca, Alsea and Siuslaw this weekend.

Recycled hatchery steelhead have been stocked in Town, Coffenbury, Lost lakes and Vernonia Pond in the NW Zone.

Winter steelhead season is in full swing on the lower Rogue, Chetco, Elk and Sixes rivers.

We've been getting reports of good ice fishing for trout and/or yellow perch at several waterbodies including Lake of the Woods, Gerber Reservoir, Phillips Reservoir, Malheur Reservoir, Pilcher Reservoir and Wolf Creek Reservoir. While ice fishing, anglers with a two-rod endorsement may use up to five rods.

There's a full complement of trout stocking scheduled for the Willamette Valley this week, including Cottage Grove Pond, Sheridan Pond, Junction City Pond, Cottage Grove Reservoir, Freeway Lake-East, EE Wilson Pond, Huddleston Pond, Sunnyside Park Pond, Alton Baker Canal, Henry Hagg Lake, St. Louis Ponds, and Dexter Reservoir.

The bag limit on trout has been lifted at Faraday Lake near Estacada through the end of March while PGE prepares to close the reservoir at the end of March.

Fishing Notices:

The Oregon Department of Agriculture (ODA) and the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife (ODFW) announce recreational <u>razor clamming is open</u> on our north coast. ODFW has lifted the conservation closure of razor clams on the Clatsop Beaches (between the mouth of the Columbia River and Tillamook Head). This closure was in place because of the small size of the clams and was not related to biotoxins. Recreational razor clamming is now OPEN from the Columbia River to Cape Blanco. Recreational razor clamming is CLOSED from Cape Blanco to the California border for elevated levels of domoic acid toxin.

Recreational crabbing is OPEN from the Columbia River to Bandon. Recreational crabbing is CLOSED from Bandon to the California border due to elevated levels of domoic acid toxin. It is always recommended you eviscerate (gut) the crab prior to cooking them and do not eat the viscera (or guts) of the crab.

Domoic acid or amnesic shellfish poisoning can cause minor to severe illness or death. Moderate poisoning can result in vomiting, diarrhea, dizziness and headaches. Severe poisoning can result in permanent short term memory loss, seizures and death. Shellfish toxins are produced by algae and originate in the ocean. Toxins cannot be removed by cooking, freezing or any other treatment.

Mussels and bay clams are OPEN for recreational harvesting along the entire coast.

The first hatchery spring Chinook has been caught on the Willamette River, marking the beginning of this popular fishery. As of Feb. 27, the use of two rods on the Willamette River is NOT allowed.



TREAD Principle Focus:

- Leave ample room for other anglers, so you don't disturb their fishing experience.
- If fishing by boat, don't crowd other anglers or watercrafts.
- Keep the noise down especially around shore and other anglers.
- Be considerate of others on the road or trail. On roads and trails, horses always have the right of way and when driving yield to hikers and bikers as well.

Update: Columbia Gillnetting

On Feb 26, 2019 a joint-state committee of Oregon and Washington fish and wildlife commissioners voted 4-2 to recommend a return to non-tribal gillnetting in the lower mainstem Columbia River during the spring and summer seasons and an increase in mainstem gillnetting during the fall season.

The recommendation to undo the 2012 bi-state Columbia River gillnet reforms comes as Columbia River salmon and steelhead returns have plummeted in recent years — leading to recreational fishing closures throughout the Columbia River basin. The vote also comes at the same time WDFW and ODFW are asking their respective legislatures to reauthorize the Columbia River Basin Salmon and Steelhead Endorsement paid for by recreational anglers. WDFW is also seeking a recreational license fee increase.

The recommendation will now go to each state's fish and wildlife commission, which would have to modify their policies/rules to reverse the Columbia River reforms, return gillnets to the mainstem, and reduce recreational fishing opportunity.

The Washington Commission will be meeting in Spokane on March 1-2 where we expect Washington Commissioner Don McIsaac (Hockinson) to push for their adoption — hundreds of miles away from most of the fisheries affected by the decision. The recommendation would also make barbless hooks "voluntary" in Columbia River recreational fisheries — a clear effort to distract anglers from the vote to undo the bi-state fishery reforms and harm our fisheries.

With the 2019 spring chinook run projected to be below 50% of the ten-year average, and summer chinook forecasted to barely meet escapment, a non-tribal gill net fishery on the lower mainstem Columbia River would be extraordinarily reckless. The fall chinook forecast is equally poor, and with record low returns of wild steelhead over the past two years, mainstem gillnetting could further erode many struggling ESA-listed stocks.

CCA will be sending out more details and action alerts shortly, so stay turned for more updates.

Summary: Coastal Conservation Association (CCA) Oregon has had meaningful positive influence on issues impacting the Willamette Basin and remains committed to continuing its work with Oregon legislators and agencies to ensure the Army Corps of Engineers meets its obligations to protect Endangered Species Act listed upper Willamette salmon and steelhead while providing robust recreational fisheries.

CCA Oregon supports current efforts to develop passage and establishment of new "wild" fish surrogates as an effort to increase fitness and bio-diversity of naturally spawning salmon where none currently exist.

CCA Oregon does not support any action that would reduce mitigation, or other hatchery augmentation, in the Willamette River system until such time as it is demonstrated that natural in-basin production can sustain robust consumptive fisheries.
